

<p>Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:</p> <p>Overall over 50% of activities have been implemented as per AWP 2008 and 70% of funds absorbed until June 2008.</p> <p>The main activities implemented are:</p> <p>1. 3. Training

CTS for BEONC for P2KS Jayapura, Advanced APN training for P2KS trainers, CTS APN for P2KS Manokwari, APN training for Jayawijaya and Manokwari, partograph training for bidan and APN attachment of Bidan to Hospital.

4. Communication strategy

A workshop was held for UNICEF staffs, other UN agency staffs, government officers at province and kabupaten level on communication strategy approach. The communication strategy approach ended up with designing a communication strategy for the kabupaten and province.

5. Avian influenza

Three activities for Avian Influenza were organised at PHO Papua comprising of multisectoral coordination meeting, social mobilisation of AI messages communities and schools in 5 high risk localities and AI workshop for journalists. Pandemic influenza for front liners are planned in Q4 with Maluku FO.

6. PMTCT program – prevention of maternal and child transmission program

The PMTCT is started in Jayapura and will be expanded to Manokwari in the 3rd quarter. It started with coordination meeting at kabupaten level, training of bidan, doctors, counselors and case managers on PMTCT, supplies of HIV test kits, monitoring activities post training and study visit to Malaysia on PMTCT program.

7. TAG committee and Joint Health Council

TAG committee revitalisation at both PHO Papua and Papua Barat as well as Joint Health Council which will see the sharing of best practices in both the provinces.

**Output of project:**

1. APN training – 60% of Bidan trained in APN by end of project
2. 2 kampong per PKM in focus districts have implemented Bidan-Dukun partnership
3. At least one BEONC and one CEONC facilities in each focus kabupaten
4. 7 PKMs in Papua and 5 PKMs in Papua Barat will be implementing PMTCT program by end of project
5. 2 supervision done in at least 6 mths period – kabupaten, PKM and Polindes
6. AI activities done in schools, communities and among stakeholders or front liners
7. Monthly bidan meeting conducted regularly
8. Communication strategy for key maternal health messages developed
9. 4 kabupaten trained in planning and budgeting tools, at least 2 districts developed maternal health programs based on this tools and received cash assistance grants from UNICEF
10. A Gender and Poverty Study finalized and submitted to the provincial government

Lessons learn

1. Bidan Dukun partnership has to be adapted according to Papua model in view of the difference in sociocultural and accessibility to health facilities.

The team includes expatriate health personnel and Indonesian staff, nurses and field facilitators. Technical support is given to Dinkes, RSUD Mulia and both Mulia and Sinak Puskesmas in training and assistance, in order to increase the health workers' skills and specialisation. An important element is to train village community health workers (cadre and mantri) and supervise their activities by direct visits to the villages in the sub-districts. These visits are held together with Puskesmas and Dinkes staff, to give health services to communities and at the same time access and respond to community health needs. An important aim is to promote the activation of outreach activities by the formal health system, including mobile clinics especially in distant villages. In Sinak district, the NGO PRIMARI, MdM partner in the field, is conducting training of health workers.</p> <p>Since the beginning of 2008, MdM includes reproductive health, safe motherhood and STI & HIV/AIDS elements in its PHC program by focusing on junior high-school students, TBA and women in the communities where MdM is working in. Techniques like role-plays, simulations, health games help the participants to reflect on these topics.</p>

Lessons learned:

MdM works in the highlands since 1999. In 2002, a one-year anthropological in-depth study had been done in Mulia in order to analyse the needs situation, and the optimal approach for an MdM intervention. In August 2004, a first project focused on the prevention of STI/HIV/AIDS in Mulia. The scope of the project was then broadening towards primary health care and training in February 2006. It was decided to include Sinak in the new project.

The involvement of Bupati, DPRD and health authorities in Puncak Jaya district is an important factor for the development of the activities and their sustainability. Today ongoing cooperation focuses on access to medicines: provided by the DinKes, MdM distributes them in the appropriate Puskesmas. Cooperation and information shared between the related actors (stakeholders and duty-bearers) is essential and does include: authorities, NGO, church groups and traditional village leaders. The Health Information System used by the DinKes must be improved to help adequate monitoring and support relevant decision-making. Resources in the villages (traditional leaders, teachers, missionaries, priests) are involved in follow-up.

A critical issue to support the improvement of the health situation is to have sufficient, and skilled human resources active in all Puskesmas around the district. Travel difficulties make access to health care much more complex and expensive for the population of Puncak Jaya in remote villages than for the people living in the major settlements

Expanding the general population knowledge about health promoting behavior (hygiene) and access to basic life saving drugs (ORS) will have an impact on communities at risk. Three other elements are also considered: Safe Motherhood, diagnosis and expanded treatment of Tuberculosis and increased prevention and access to diagnosis and treatment for STI/HIV/AIDS.

Local Partner NGO PRIMARI, MDM main partner, started its community health training program in Sinak area. The focus is the training of mantri (originally trained by the missionaries) and cadre that provide health services.

Health staff is only one actor for improvement. A lesson learned is that more general health education must be provided regarding reproductive health and safe motherhood for the mothers and girls in the villages, as is information about STI, HIV/AIDS for adolescents and their families. In July 2008 a ToT was held on sexual and reproductive health for high-school teachers together with partner PRIMARI.

Traditional birth attendants are trained together with village women on safe delivery and to manage basic obstetric care. When possible, midwives from Puskesmas will be involved. Accurate knowledge is low and often magical ideas surround these diseases. Villagers often seek their medical care outside the health structure via traditional methods. The growing HIV/AIDS epidemic has led to some clan conflicts and casualties as patients were considered to have been cursed. Objective information and promotion of



prevention methods (condom use) are needed to diminish this trend. The elaboration of relevant IEC material is essential in this regard.

Since January 2008 MDM is part of the Stop Aids Now! Coalition. Under coordination of FOKER LSM, MdM cooperates with 10 other NGOs to strengthen attention and work on gender, women rights and HIV/AIDS.

MdM observes a real need for resources and advocates for condoms availability, human resources for health activities, presence of KPA (the government commission for HIV/AIDS) in Mulia, domestic violence and gender issues.

Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:

In implementing the program, UNICEF works closely with government at provincial and district level namely Planning Board (Bappeda), Education Department, Health Department and AIDS Commission.

Several activities namely workshop and training for capacity building, advocacy, monitoring and evaluation, production of IEC material and technical assistance were conducted to achieve the aim of the program.

Lessons learn and progress of the project:

1. The project is being implemented in an environment where there is great diversity of the population, geographic reach, and spread of the programme. This is coupled with insufficient capacity available at the district and sub-district level in the competence areas required for successful implementation of the project.



2. Decentralization of the education system in Papua implies the need to advocate to the principal of each school for HIV interventions to be implemented. This process was time consuming.

3. Discussions with government, NGOs, FBOs and UN partners show opportunities and willingness to link HIV prevention with health services for young people. This includes making the Puskesmas (health centres) youth friendly by establishing

opening hours that are convenient to young people, and involving young people to help the staff, and to do peer-education activities at the clinic.

4. Potential prospective collaborative efforts with other partners to develop more innovative means to disseminate information and education of HIV/AIDS prevention among youth in line with the principles of continuum of care in HIV and AIDS which will be contributed by stakeholders.

**Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:**

Primary Education haven been implemented for the Training of Tutors (TOT) for literacy in October 2009 and following on this, health training of village health workers, agriculture, livelihood and conservation programs will be implemented in January 2010. The programs are participatory with the communities and other local CSO (church, LMA and local government).

Output of project:

Primary Education: It is expected that men, women graduated from this nonformal education will be able to read, write and perform simple mathematics and communicate in structural manner and hereby enhance their self-respect. This will equip their lives to adapt to changes that are taking place in the community and to contribute in the development process in their village and communities.

Primary Health Education: It is expected that through this training the village health workers will be able to treat common illnesses in the villages, handle maternity cases, childcare programs, but also to motivate the people to keep the environment of their villages clean, building public toilets, clean water supply and other preventative methods to prevent illnesses rather than to cure: "prevention is better than curing." Through continuous coaching from the medical doctor for this program, there will be fewer cases of chronic diseases and the people will then be able to sustain this program through their own initiatives and efforts.

Livelihood Programs Training: It is expected that by the end of the project's period small community's enterprises, either in form of cooperatives or working groups will exist, that will be able to run their business on their own and take active part in the village economy and thereby break the vicious cycle of dependency. Women will also then take active in the part in these enterprises and there will division of labor i.e. independent vocations and trade, each contributing in the cycle of the household economy of the village.

Agriculture and Animal Husbandry: this program is to support the Livelihood Program and Health Program and Conservation. It is expected that gradually during the project's presence in this area, replicas of small-scale farming are present in the surrounding villages and in home gardens in the villages. Daily food intake will be improved with nutrients and there will be a systematic farming system for cash crops where there is a market outlet for the products from the villages.

Conservation: Towards the end of the project's presence, it is expected that there will be community's awareness on managing the development of their own natural resources. They will be more resilient towards extractive industries, prevention of traditional slash and burn methods and will take conservation



activities into their own hands. Continuous support and coaching from conservation NGO's will be present although decreasing. They will be partners in planning and conducting scientific researches that will support their effort in developing their natural resources in a sustainable manner.

Lessons learn and progress of the project:

Through capacity building and the process of First and Primary Informed Consent (FPIC) will increase the involvement and participation of the local communities in the development planning and implementation. They will be more resilient to changes in in their villages and the region and will actively be the development process for sustainability for their future generations..

**Progress of Project:**

Piloted locations of this project were spread across Wamena and around, and the center to implement this activity is at Business Training Center (*Balai Latihan Bisnis* or *BLB*) YOP in Wamena.

BLB has planned and provide training and courses on annual basis to indigineous youth who want to start their own business. The participants of training were selected and invited to BLB. They were placed at various level of training, depend on their basic knowledge. BLB provide dormitory for the participants from outside the town of Wamena. Participants were required to pay money in accordance with the lodgment period courses (usually 5-day in one-time course)

The activities undertaken are:

1. Courses: Chainsaw courses, kiosk courses, workshops and welding courses, cake making courses, building design courses, computer courses, seminars, business awareness raising, and several other public courses.
2. Advanced training : kiosk management, workshops and welding training , canteen business training, rental business training, meuble business and vegetable trade business training.
3. Regular on-site coaching on entrepreneurship for entrepreneurs in villages and Wamena Kota.
4. Providing micro-credits for the participants of training who has willingness and capabilities in starting their own business.
5. Provide entrepreneurship awareness raising seminars to the community who interested in start their own business. Seminars were provided to farmer groups, foundations and schools.
6. Piloting small business: Oikios (kiosk), Oibengkel (workshop), Oiental (computer rental), Oiwarung (small store), Oimeuble (carpentry) and train local entrepreneurs who need further trainings.
7. Assist communities in planning their small business.
8. Developing curriculum (Guidelines for small businesses. Developed by consultant and adviser: Heidi Scheunemann)

<p>Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:</p> <p>Addressing GBV in Papua, which is rooted in traditional <i>adat</i> practices, requires a pluralistic approach in terms of the sectors and mechanisms that the program will address in order to bring about a decrease in GBV.</p> <p>With GBV rooted in traditional <i>adat</i> practices, the program strategy will balance respect towards traditional values while emphasizing the universality of basic human rights and women's rights. Examining <i>adat</i> practices through guided group discussions to analyze harmful practices that cause/perpetuate GBV will serve as an entry point to introduce DVAW, CEDAW and the Indonesian legal system and promotion of the rule of law. Project activities will focus on the identification of factors involved in GBV, appreciation of its impact, and the search for recourse.</p>			
<p>Lessons learn and progress of the project:</p> <p>The program period is from May 21, 2007 to May 22, 2009. ICMC arrived in Jayapura by the end of June 2007 and started a series of meetings to "socialize" (inform) various authorities and stakeholders of the program to ensure a common understanding of the program and to avoid overlapping actions among humanitarian actors. In addition ICMC opened an office in Waena, Jayapura and recruited proper staffs to ensure proper implementation of the program.</p> <p>ICMC together with AIDP (Aliansi Demokrasi untuk Papua), LBH-Papua and LP3AP have conducted assessment and socialisation to targeted villages and have developed draft of facilitation modules to be used in facilitating discussion on GBV issues and also monitoring and evaluation tools. - School has to maintain the facility and integrate hygiene education as one of school programme.
- The involvement of local community in planning and implementation process is very important. It is expected that at least the community could participate in kind, in establishing the sanitation facilities.
- Institutional capacity building for school to conduct hygiene education and monitor student behavior improvement/changes.

3. Water and Environment Health in City Slum Areas

Implementing Strategy :

- Sanitation activity will use SANIMAS project approach.
- Community of city slum areas will be involved in project planning and implementation.
- Community has responsibility in maintaining and managing the facilities.
- There will be special training on maintaining and managing the facilities.
- Effort in connecting PDAM to city slum area.
- Cross-subsidy mechanism will be used to help the poor community.
- Small-scale water vendors could be developed through public-private-partnerships
- A micro credit scheme will be used to help community to install water pipes to their houses.
- Working committee at village level could be formed. They will be responsible for managing the facilities.
- Promotion of 4Rs (reduce, reuse, recycle and recover)
- Community-based waste management will be developed in city slum area.
- Composting could be done by the community, according to their social and economic condition and their infrastructure planning.

Progress of the project:

1. Commemoration of International Year of Sanitation (IYS) 2008 through kinds activities in province and kabupaten level. Seminar, drawing competition and tree planting were held in Kota Jayapura on IYS Day, 22 March 2008. Campaign on hand washing with soap was held in Kabupaten Jayapura and Jayawijaya through public activities and promotion material (banners) in strategic areas.
2. Hand washing campaign was held at provincial level. Involving approximately 800 elementary students from Kota Jayapura. The campaign also was held in Kabupaten Jayapura and Jayawijaya, involving 200 elementary students at each kabupaten. The campaign was supported by Bupati and Walikota. They demonstrated the right phase of hand washing with soap, and followed by the students.



Bupati Jayapura and staffs washed their hands with soap, guided by Kepala Dinas Kesehatan, and followed by hundreds of students of SD Ibul Kemtuk Gresi.

3. Pokja AMPL formed (Water and dan Healthy Environmet) in 4 Kabupaten: Kabupaten Biak Numfor, Kabupaten Jayapura, Kabupaten Jayawijaya and Kabupaten Puncak Jaya. Pokja AMPL consists of related technical department such as BAPPEDA, Dinas Kesehatan, Dinas PU, Dinas P & P, BPMD and civil society organisation.

4. Recruitment of technical facilitators and hygiene promotion facilitators in each targeted kabupaten.
5. Discussion with communities at 6 villages in 3 targeted kabupaten. Daily activities related to sanitation and hygiene were identified by community. After identifying the activities, they considered themselves which of the activities are healthy lifestyle.
6. School planning to ensure the school commitment in school sanitation programme and hygiene education (SSPH) and build infrastructures (physical and non-physical). Physical infrastructure covers clean water and sanitation infrastructure. Non physical infrastructure covers training for teachers and students, hygiene session in class, and also hand wash with soap campaign. In Kabupaten Jayawijaya and Kabupaten Biak Numfor, twelve elementary schools have conducted participatory planning, involving headmaster, teacher and school committee. Three elementary schools was chosen from four targeted districts (two district per kabupaten) in Kabupaten Jayawijaya and Biak.



Socialisation and planning process in in Kabupaten Jayawijaya

1. Identification of water sources and appropriate technology in establishing clean water infrastructures in targeted kabupaten. Community committed and supported the process of establishing watsan infrastructures through providing local material and working voluntarily. Clean water committee has been formed in Kampung Bakribo and Kampung Waroi Kabupaten Biak Numfor. The formation of clean water committee in other targeted kabupaten will continue.

Lesson learn:

1. The commitment of provincial and kabupaten government through budget allocation for water and sanitation play an important role to the success of program.
2. The implementation of hand wash with soap and sanitation infrastructure will be more effective through the involvement of local community. They could implement the programme with their own resources without subsidy.
3. Increasing access to clean water for drink and households requires the application of various appropriate technology.
4. Through the implementation of this programme, elementary school students could have access to clean water and sanitation.

Project Description:

PNPM Mandiri-Respek program is the policy of Provincial Government, supported by Central Government. The objective is to empower Papua communities in villages and city as well through support in development planning, implementation and keep the sustainability of program. Expectantly through this program, the community will reach prosperity and independence.

Pendampingan for District, Kabupaten and Province:

Block Grant:

Block grants for the communities is 100 million per village and 100 million per district (for activities at district level). The fund is allocated from Special Autonomy fund.

District Facilitators at district, kabupaten and provincial level

Support for the communities in development activities is done through multilevel professional assistances (pendampingan), start from the village, district, kabupaten through province. Each district is facilitated by 2-3 district facilitators, and each kabupaten is facilitated by 2 kabupaten facilitators. In provincial level, there are 8 consultants and one provincial coordinator. The main tasks of facilitator are: to provide assistances for stakeholders at district and village level in conducting activities according to the principles and procedures; mediate the problem solving process; report the progress of activities; collecting data of village potencies; and conduct monitoring and evaluation of programs.

Coordination Team and Task Force:

In conducting activities, Coordination Teams at provincial and kabupaten level play major role. The Task Force plays role as the implementing party in provincial and kabupaten level. The Coordination team consists of representatives of all related technical departments and its main task is to coordinate all program activities.

Plan, methods, and mechanism of implementation:

Trainings :

At the first phase, the kabupaten and district facilitators were recruited, trained, and mobilised to their



respective duty station. PJOK (Penanggung Jawab Operasional Kegiatan or Operational Coordinator) or one of district staff were trained so they understand and capable in managing the programme. Training for district and village stakeholders were held by PJOK and district facilitator. The training were held prior to programme implementation so the stakeholder could understand programme procedure and mechanism.

Training for facilitator, programme coordinator and community will be held on regular basis, structured and continuous. Facilitators play role as pendamping for program implementer and community. Special training for technical facilitators were held for six months. Technical facilitators were assigned to kampung level because less civil engineers worked in Papua. Technical facilitators are high school graduates which have technical skills. The activities was funded by AusAID.

Program Implementation Phase

In provincial and kabupaten level, the programme was socialised to all programme implementers, especially the coordination team, so they could understand the programme better.

In programme implementation, there are cycles of programme phase. The cycles were used in monitoring the programme implementation, so the activities could be planned, measured to ensure programme quality. Expectantly the it could be a learning process for the community. The community could participate in programme implementation and benefited from the programme. The phase cycles are as follows:

- Data collection for Village Potency
- District Meeting and Socialisation or Musyawarah District Sosialisasi (MUSDISOS)
- Village Meeting and Socialisation of Musyawarah Kampung Sosialisasi (Muskamsos)
- Participative Planning or Perencanaan Bersama Masyarakat (PBM)
- Preparation Meeting of Musyawarah Persiapan Pelaksanaan
- Fund channeling Phase I
- Financial Reporting Phase I
- Fund Channeling Phase II
- Financial Reporting Phase II
- Musyawarah Serah Terima

Programme Activity : Grants for community have open menu, but community need to focus their programme to food and nutrition, basic education, health, local economy development, basic infrastructure and capacity building. The women groups were provided 15% of the grants for their own activities.

**Progress of Project:**

PNPM Mandiri Respek has just started the training process of programme implementer in April to June 2008. The result are as follows:

PNPM has trained programme implementer at district and kabupaten level; 9 consultant at provincial level with one coordinator and several specialists.

Training has been provided to 283 PJOK.

The progress of project to end of June 2008 are:

Village Database 60%

Musyawarah District Sosialisasi 27%

Musyawarah Kampung Sosialisasi 3%

Lesson Learn:

This programme has been started since 1998, as Program Pengembangan Kecamatan (District Development Programme). But in 2007, the Papua Provincial Government officially launched this programme as PNPM Respek. There are lessons learned during programme implementation. Achievement and obstacles are always become the part of programme implementation. Learning from previous experience of PPK, the programme has made several adjustment in its implementation. In PNPM Mandiri RESPEK, the strategies are direct approaches to community at village level, and consider the appropriate approaches to local context and Papua cultures. These strategies become important principles in programme implementation.

Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:

One advisor from each component will assist government and communities' key institutions to plan their



MDGs program. Bappeda will serve as the coordinator of programs in the region and monitor the progress of programs implementation. BPMD will manage the assistance/pendampingan component at District or Village/Village level.

Annual work plan will be prepared by implementing partners, and approved by Provincial level Advisory Boards. Advisory Boards will actively participating in monitoring and evaluation of program achievements. UNDP will be the manager of the trust fund and pay directly to the vendors. Provincial and regency government through RESPEK programs will allocate the Otsus fund for basic services delivery.

The program expectantly will be expanding (after one or two years) if provincial and regency governments allocate more Otsus fund and donors support additional funding for the achievement of MDGs.

Output of Project:

The program started on 1 July 2006; with inception period until end of 2006. During the inception phase, structure and procedures of programmes were prepared, BAPPEDA Papua Province were trained and facilitated in RPJM drafting (based on the result of Synthesis from Papua Needs Assessment) and RPJM (based on vision and mission from Governor).

Technical assistances also have been provided for Bappeda Kabupaten Mimika, Sarmi, Raja Ampat and Fak-Fak in preparation of RPJM and Renstra sektoral.

Up to mid 2008, the project has achieved the following output:

1. Data collection tools and instruments to collect data on indigenous Papuan people were prepared together with BPS and Bappeda Papua Province; training of trainer for kabupaten/district planner; employment policy review; partnership with CSO in conducting MDG baseline survey at Village and district level; assistance in preparing medium term development plan as well as strategic development plan.
2. Grants has been distribute to 14 CSO for services related to MDG-RESPEK and 3 LSM pendamping, NUNVs as district facilitator have been assigned at selected district, expert pool database has been developed; guidelines for grants channeling and resource centre management has been developed; three resource centers is established in three district (Pantura-Yapen Waropen, Pantai Timur-Sarmi and Bolakme-Jayawijaya), good practices from several kabupaten has been documented.
3. Preliminary Publication on MDGs achievement in Tanah Papua has been done, institutional analysis BAWASDA and capacity building and planning BAWASDA is implemented.
4. Five editions of booklet has been published, regular meeting between UN agencies and other donors has been implemented, log frame of UN joint programme has been developed and multidonor office is in preparation process.

Lesson Learn :

Lesson learned during Papua Needs Assessment and program implementation in 2007 are as follows: it



can be conclude that there are needs for continuous and long-term assistance to develop Papua and Papua Barat based on best practices from previous approach, and based on approaches that eliminate dependencies.

The capacities of local stakeholders need to be strengthen and the partnership between local government and CSOs, especially religious institutions who have wide networks and capacity to support the communities, need to be established.

Close coordination at kabupaten level directly or through UNV also support the implementation of activities at kabupaten level. In the other hand, the division of kabupaten requires more efforts in program coordination and assistances.

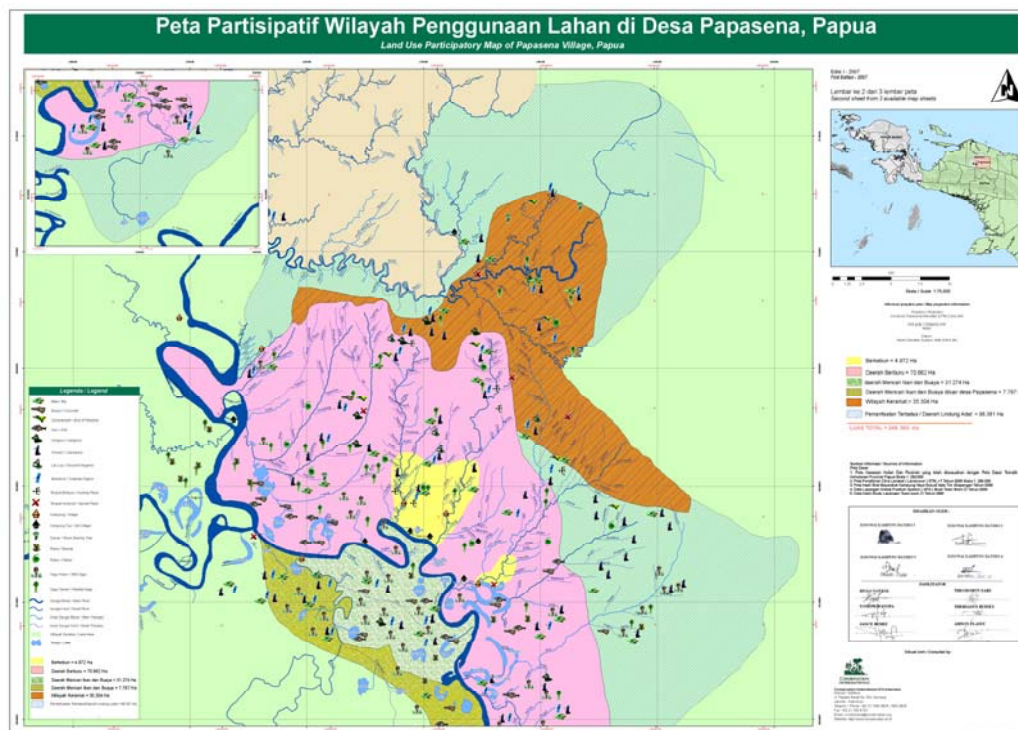

**Project Description:**

ILO – EAST is funded by Government of Netherland, and the duration is four years. The objectives of the project are to enhance the decent work opportunity and entrepreneurship skills for youth through improving of access to both education and relevant training, (2) to support the child labor elimination. The project covers Papua, West Papua, Nusa Tenggara Timur, Maluku, South Sulawesi and Nangroe Aceh Darussalam. The project consists of several component which will be implemented by the CSO and institution in national, provincial and kabupaten level.

First component. The target group is junior high school age students (13 – 15 years old) and their community. This project will try to enhancing access to junior high school through protection of drop-out, re-enroll the out-of-school youth and prevention of child labor; extra curricular activity for skills development (personal and social skills); and improving the teachers' ability in providing career and education counseling for their students (through formal or non formal system) and prepare them to get decent work. This component will be implemented in collaboration with educational organization, teacher association, and non-government organization (NGO).

This component will support the enhancement of employment opportunity for youth through basic and vocational skills training (based on market demand); entrepreneur training; and job and career counseling. This component will be implemented in collaboration with non formal training institutions, either public or private institutions.

Third component. Main focus on senior high school students (15 to 18 years old). The implementation of this component will support decent work preparation. through entrepreneur training; and supports for career counseling and consultation. This component will be implemented in coordination with education institutions and non-government organization (NGO)

Fourth component. The main focus of this component is youth (18 years or above) who participated in Vocational Training Centers in Jayapura, Sorong. This component support the capacity development in management for education and training centers; establish networking with private sector; assisting the implementation of competence based standard; and provide the tools needed. This component also supports the cooperation among training centers in Papua so they could exchange experience and knowledge.

Fifth component covers the training, advocating and policy formulation focusing on: documentation of the relationship between child labor elimination and decent work for youth; channeling the problems faced by young entrepreneurs to policy makers at provincial or national level; and promotes the mainstreaming of best practices and the project to relevant policies formulation.

This project emphasizes the mainstreaming of gender issues in project and actively promotes gender equality in accessing education and work. At national and provincial level, this project will be coordinated by steering committee in tripartite and working group.

Plan, methods and mechanism of the implementation:

Planning method:

Intervention will be designed and prioritized on a village by village basis; based on results of surveys (KAPC, IHFA assessment, Watsan and CBDRM) and community plan developed using fully community based participatory approach.

PCI through its Field Facilitators supported by Field Technician, Site Supervisor and Specialist provide facilitation, training and support to the target communities so that they can plan, implement and monitor the village level project activities.

Close coordination with local government kept continue to be done to ensure NHDM could become active part of local development strategy. And upon NHDM completed local government could continue to adopt and to adapt NHDM approach and achievement as well as: community participatory approach; capacity building to local people to plan and implement water and sanitation program; capacity building to local Kader to promote and to change good behavior on health practices and paradigm.
